

We expanded our Internship Program to create year-round opportunities for high school and college-aged students with **71 paid internships at 35 companies**, building social capital and career readiness skills.





After graduating from The High School of Fashion Industries, she continued her studies at SUNY Plattsburgh, maintaining active participation in our Internship Program. After attending a learning pod with Blueprint NYC in 2020, she returned as their Communications Intern this summer and received a **JOB OFFER!**

Nashalae joined Free Arts NYC in 2018. On a visit to Paramount during Creative Career Week, she was inspired to learn that employees in the Integrated Marketing department held varying degrees. She realized she could explore all of her interests without being deterred from her eventual career goal. Since 2020, Nashalae has interned at Bustle, Orchard Street Ventures and Elite Daily. This spring she began an internship at Kaleidoscope Consulting where **she's thriving!** Nashalae is graduating from the Fashion Institute of Technology next year. Her plan is to work for a few years before applying to attend Polimoda in Florence, Italy, to obtain her Master's Degree in Fashion Trend Forecasting.

The Free Arts Day Program introduces children, ages 6-12, to artists, art movements, styles and materials This year we worked with 1,800 children through:

FREE ARTS DAYS

pair children 1:1 with a volunteer mentor for an afternoon of art making and "mini mentoring." Themes this year centered around Community and Change with projects inspired by **Cristina Iglesias**, **Faith Ringgold** and **Futura** among others. After a two and half year hiatus, we were thrilled to host **14 in-person events** with **425 volunteers** and **500 children**.

VIRTUAL FREE ARTS DAYS

were developed during COVID and continued through the first half of 2022. Art supplies were sent to our community partners and over **200 children** participated from their classrooms across **46 events**, and **3 workshops** with **The Neon Tea Party**.

ART KITS + FUN CARDS

are inspired by a variety of artists including **Derrick Adams, Devin Troy Strother** and **Nina Chanel Abney**. In partnership with **Supplies for Success** we sent **3,400 art kits** and **1,800 backpacks** to youth to ensure they were able to have continued access to art making. 50% of these students are living in transitional housing.

FAD STUDIOS


are bi-monthly, skill-based workshops for elementary age students who show a deeper interest in art and a way to transition into the Teen Arts Program. The group visited **Journal Gallery with Marcus Leslie Singleton**, enjoyed a workshop with **Dionis Ortiz**, and worked with **Art Random** on a collaborative project designed around the art we see everyday.

Free Arts is striving to ensure that staff and leadership are reflective of our community. As a result, of the staff members who participated in a survey, 15% identified as Hispanic/Latinx/e, 7% identified as Asian/South Asian, Black/African-American, Middle Eastern or chose not to identify, and 38% of staff members spoke at least one language beyond English. In addition, 7% are non-binary and 30% of staff identify as part of the LGBTQIA community. 15% members have a disability/diversability.

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
